What is Radiotherapy?



- Radiotherapy is the use of very high energy x-rays to treat disease (usually cancer).
- It doesn't hurt. It's just like having a normal x-ray.
- It is usually only used to treat small areas of the body - there is very little dose to the rest of the patient, and no dose at all to those working in the department. Staff and volunteers are perfectly safe.
- Patients can attend between one to forty times, usually daily, so often build up an important relationship with both staff and other patients in the department. Volunteers are an important part of that support network!
