Ward 6 is a 22 bedded cardiology and an acute medical ward specialising in the care of adults with cardiac and medical problems.

Two cardiology consultants are based on the ward. Admissions come predominantly from MAU (Medical Assessment Unit), step down from CCU, transfer from other wards, from Accident and Emergency and on occasions from Out-patients' Clinic or from other hospitals.

We endeavour to provide each patient and their families with appropriately planned and evaluated care which will be given professionally and always thoughtfully, safely honestly and with compassion. We are committed to maintaining the dignity and privacy of patients in our care.

We are a united team with a common goal, to provide a considerate, efficient and effective service.

As a trained member of staff on the ward you will receive training to become competent in:

- IV therapy (including the use of PICC lines and Central Venous Catheters)
- Venepuncture and cannulation
- Non invasive Ventilation & High-Flow Oxygen Therapy
- Chest drain management, flushing, removal
- Tracheostomy care
- Capillary gas sampling & arterial blood gas sampling
- We have a respiratory study day that all trained nurses working on Laurel 2 attend, and then come away with a learning pack and competency booklet to work through with an allocated mentor.

As a Healthcare Assistant on the ward you will:

- Receive training to carry out patient observations and calculations of PARS
- Attend a HCA training programme
- Receive IT training in conjunction with the Trust's IT systems
- Receive training to carry out venepuncture

All members of staff on the ward receive mandatory Trust training every year and there are a wide range of e-learning modules for all staff to complete. All members of staff receive an annual PDR & PDP. All members of staff also have the opportunity to take on a link nurse role in an area of practice in which they are interested.

Our aim is to create Gold standards of care for every patient through the 6Cs:

- Care – Caring is what you should be about. You must be committed to helping patients through every stage of their illness / treatment.
- Compassion – You must be empathetic and able to treat patients with respect and dignity when delivering their care.
- Competence – You must be willing to participate in education and training to enable you to deliver effective care and treatments.
- Communication – You must possess excellent communication and listening skills.
- Courage – You must be able to welcome change and new ways of working to benefit our patients.
- Commitment – By being committed to your work you will ensure patients receive excellent care and experiences of our health care service.
